
# **BOOKS, BOOKS, & MORE!**

### Are you from Graves County?

Yes! I was born and raised in Symsonia. I graduated from GCHS in 2014!

Who are your favorite authors and why do you love them?

My favorite authors are those that I go back to over and over again. Suzanne Collins has been a favorite of mine since she first released Hunger Games. I come back to her often, and I always find something new to love. Chuck Palahniuk is another author I find myself reaching for, my personal shelves are bursting with color from his books. He's a bit of an acquired taste, for sure, but I can always relate to his characters, most of whom are deeply flawed, while getting lost in the narrative. Rant, Choke, and Diary, are my all time favorites. I love to read horror, so I have to shout out a few of my favorite horror authors as well: Christopher Buehlman (Those Across the River and Between Two Fires), Chelsea G. Summers (A Certain Hunger), Nick Cutter (The Deep and The Troop), and Max Brooks (World War Z and Devolution). It can be difficult to find truly scary horror novels, but these folks managed to write beautiful (and truly horrifying) stories.

What are you currently reading?

I like to read several books at a time (unless I find a book I am truly captivated by). So, right now, I'm reading Paul Tremblay's new book Horror Movie, Colm Tóibín's Long Island, and The Loop by Jeremy Robert Johnson. I just finished listening to Shift, the 3rd book in the Silo Series by Hugh Howey, on Libby.

What are your outside interests?

I love learning, so I'm always trying new things and exploring new interests. I'm deeply fascinated by ecology and herpetology, so I love spending time outdoors; hiking, camping, and watching nature—and I dabble in nature photography! I enjoy traveling. I love trying new foods, going to concerts, and exploring new areas and cultures. When I'm not out and about, I like to hang out with my husband, my two dogs, and play video games, binge watch television, and listen to music.

• How long have you been with GCPL and what job titles have you had here?

I started at GCPL in January 2024 as a Library Assistant, and have truly found such an amazing group.

What gives you the most satisfaction as a library employee?

At the risk of sounding cliche, I am most fulfilled when patron's tell me that they are new to reading, or have come back to it after a long break. I love seeing people leave with stacks of books, or even just one, because I think reading is so important. In a broader sense, I love what libraries mean for their community, as a place for people to congregate, to learn and build new skills, to use the resources we provide; and that alone gives me satisfaction.

• What changes have you seen at GCPL since you began working here?

One of the more noticeable changes since I began working at GCPL is how our patrons are interacting with the book displays. With a facelift to our display shelves in front of the circulation, we've been able to increase the amount of books we can showcase. Once I settled into the groove of the library, I was able to start putting together one of the displays myself! Being mindful of trends, patron interests, and our book selection; this display combined with the second display—which often showcases awareness to disabilities, minorities, and underrepresented groups—means our front desk displays have garnered more interest than ever before!

# CHILDREN'S SUMMER READING PROGRAM WRAP UP: READ-A-WAY CAMP!


This year's summer reading theme was Read-A-Way Camp. We continued the use of ReaderZone to promote reading. We had a total of 201 readers who read a total of 2,205 books. 120 of the readers were children, and they read 1,750 books. That's more than half of all the books read during summer reading!

For every 5 books read, children would receive a prize such as a compass, flashlight, and canteen. They would also receive a bag and a chance to win a grand prize just for participating.

We had a total of 499 people attend our programming. There was a camping safety program which taught us the differences between safe and dangerous plants. The kids got to go bug hunting for pretend bugs to learn about their habitats. We even had a craft day. The coolest program was folk tales with Paul Strickland.

Camp Read-A-Way Day was at the end of June. We served hamburgers, hotdogs, soda, and chips. There were games and crafts for all ages as well. We also had a drawing for door prizes.

Overall, this year's summer reading program was a success. Thank you for your support!

# RENOVATED KITCHEN IN SMALL COMMUNITY ROOM






# What's New at the Library

Stay Sharp Kits

The library purchased six memory kits curated by Penworthy to help people with dementia or Alzheimer's disease. They are categorized by subject matter like movies and history. An example is the Garden Kit that includes DK Eyewitness Plant and What's that Flower, Garden Wonders Aquapaints™, Garden Gathering Shaped Puzzle, and Pick a Flower: a Memory Game. The first activity allows for relaxation and calmness of the mind through painting. The second two activities will create a sense of achievement, while reinforcing the connection between brain cells and improving mental speed and short-term memory. These kits circulate through the library and bookmobile.
